

Health & Safety Policy of Thornbury Magazine Ltd

Our policy is to:

- 1. Ensure healthy and safe working conditions, equipment and systems of work for our volunteers and committee members.
- 2. Provide such advice, information and training as is necessary to volunteers.

It is the intention of Thornbury Magazine Management Committee to comply with all health and safety legislation and to act positively where it can reasonably do so to prevent injury, ill health or any danger arising from its activities and operations.

Thornbury Magazine Management Committee considers the promotion of the health and safety of its volunteers at work to be of great importance. The Management Committee recognises that the effective prevention of accidents depends as much on a committed attitude of mind to safety as on the operation and maintenance of equipment and safe systems of work. To this end it will seek to encourage volunteers and committee members to engage in the establishment and observance of safe working practices.

Thornbury Magazine expects all volunteers to treat their fellow volunteers, and members of the public, with courtesy and respect at all times. Bullying or offensive behaviour from either Magazine volunteers, or members of the public, towards any Magazine volunteers will not be tolerated.

Volunteers will be expected to recognise that there is a duty on them to comply with the practices set out by the Management Committee and to accept responsibility to do everything they can to prevent injury to themselves or others.

Recruitment of volunteers

The decision to recruit a volunteer is based solely on their ability to contribute effectively to the management and/or distribution of Thornbury Magazine. If the candidate is vulnerable to hazards other than those in our standard list or likely to put others at greater risk, an assessment is made to judge whether or not it is viable to employ them.

All volunteers are referred to our health and safety policy on the website and the list of hazards with advice on how to manage them. Our health and safety policy and insurance statement are displayed at circulation.
